## **2. Literature Review**

Transitioning to a green economy aligns Indonesia with global sustainable development goals (SDGs) and is essential for long-term economic resilience. Iswanto (2024) argue that the COVID-19 pandemic underscored the need to integrate sustainable practices into economic policies. Indicators like low-carbon development and resource efficiency are increasingly recognized as key measures of economic progress, guiding Indonesia's commitment to environmentally responsible growth. Implementing green economy initiatives, however, faces significant challenges. Wibowo (2023) emphasize the importance of robust government policies, public awareness, and community engagement. Involving communities in local decision-making processes fosters ownership and increases the likelihood of success. Additionally, fostering green innovation at the local level can enhance energy efficiency and promote sustainable growth, exemplifying Indonesia's multi-faceted approach to sustainability (Shah, 2022).

Despite the progress in some areas, barriers remain, especially for small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) in rural regions. Limited access to capital, insufficient infrastructure, and a lack of skilled labor are significant obstacles. Cultural and structural constraints further limit economic opportunities for women and marginalized communities, underscoring the need for policies that not only promote economic growth but also address social inequalities (Sukmawati & Maryanti., 2022). To overcome these challenges, empowerment programs must leverage existing community assets, a strategy known as "Asset-Based Community Development" (Surya et al., 2020). Such programs foster long-term participation, self-reliance, and resilience, creating pathways for sustainable local growth. The emphasis on building from within communities aligns with Indonesia's broader goals of equitable development and social inclusion.

Addressing regional inequalities is essential for a balanced economic transition. Research by Dahliah (2020) points to limited workforce availability, inadequate infrastructure, and insufficient financial support in peripheral areas as factors that restrict economic opportunities and deepen regional disparities. Substantial investments in infrastructure and education, alongside targeted support for local businesses, are vital to creating inclusive growth that reaches even the most remote regions of Indonesia. Inspired by models like China's e-commerce demonstration cities, establishing digital economic hubs could enhance Indonesia's regional development. These hubs would enable SMEs to leverage digital platforms, improving their market reach and resilience against economic fluctuations. By

fostering regional empowerment, Indonesia can create a more balanced and integrated national economy.

### **3. Methods**

This research adopts a qualitative approach, utilizing a literature review to explore the role of community empowerment and green economy initiatives in driving sustainable economic development in Indonesia. Saleh et al. (2020) explore the economic development of Indonesia's remote regions, emphasizing the challenges these areas face in achieving sustainable growth. They identify key issues such as demographic pressures, poor infrastructure, financial constraints, and regional inequalities that hinder development. The authors advocate for targeted government intervention and investment in infrastructure to bridge the gap between urban and remote regions. They stress the importance of policies that promote inclusive growth, empower local communities, and address the disparities that exist between these areas. Moreover, Sagar et al. (2023) discusses the role of economic empowerment in fostering prosperity, particularly for vulnerable groups in Indonesia. The study underscores that economic empowerment is crucial for improving the quality of life, reducing inequality, and promoting independence. While highlighting the positive effects of community empowerment initiatives, the author also points out challenges such as limited funding and lack of awareness that must be addressed for these initiatives to be effective. This research emphasizes the need for comprehensive policies and programs that support marginalized communities and foster sustainable economic development.

Furthermore, Cillo et al. (2019) focuses on the role of sustainable innovation in transforming island economies, particularly in Indonesia, where infrastructure challenges and connectivity issues persist. The study emphasizes the importance of innovation in agriculture and fisheries, which can empower vulnerable groups and create inclusive economic growth. Bangsawan advocates for collaborative, participatory approaches to ensure that sustainable technologies lead to long-term economic benefits and contribute to environmental sustainability. This work

highlights the potential for sustainable practices to drive the transformation of island economies. In addition, Donthu et al. (2021) conduct a bibliometric analysis of 195 papers from the Scopus database to examine the development of Indonesia's green economy in a global context. Their study reveals a significant increase in research publications over the past decade, reflecting growing academic interest in Indonesia's green economy and its role in promoting environmental sustainability. The authors highlight the importance of this shift, which aligns with Indonesia's broader commitment to sustainable development. The surge in research publications serves as an indicator of the country's advancing efforts to integrate green economic strategies into its overall development agenda.

Soeswoyo et al. (2021) explore the potential of tourism in Indonesia through the lens of the digital and creative economy, emphasizing the sector's significant contributions to job creation and income generation. However, the study also identifies critical challenges, such as regional disparities, inadequate infrastructure, and governance issues that hinder sustainable growth in tourism. The authors stress the transformative power of digital technologies and the creative economy in enhancing tourism, advocating for strategic planning, sustainable practices, and collaboration among stakeholders to ensure that tourism contributes to long-term, equitable economic development in the country. Also, Irawan et al. (2023) examines the role of productivity improvement in achieving decent work and economic growth, in line with the 8th Sustainable Development Goal. The study identifies key drivers of productivity in Indonesia, including education, skills training, and technological innovation. Ponto highlights how improving productivity can lead to better wages, job stability, and overall economic growth, while also noting the challenges of limited technology adoption in traditional sectors and insufficient investment in education and training. The research emphasizes the importance of a supportive work environment to sustain productivity gains and ensure equitable growth.

In examining the challenges Indonesia faces in recovering from the Covid-19 pandemic, which has disrupted key development goals such as poverty alleviation and the transition to a green economy, Nuringsih & Nuryasman (2021) stress the need for innovative policies that prioritize sustainable development, using green economy indicators to measure progress. They argue that the pandemic has compounded both economic and health crises, underscoring the importance of green economy strategies that promote environmental sustainability and economic resilience. The article calls for a strategic approach to align Indonesia's recovery efforts with its long-term sustainability goals. Fitrah & Soemitra (2022) explore the potential of green economy policies in Indonesia, emphasizing their ability to reduce environmental impacts, stimulate economic growth, and create sustainable jobs. They focus particularly on renewable energy investments and effective waste management systems as key drivers for a green economy. The authors also highlight the importance of community empowerment, robust policy frameworks, and

overcoming barriers such as public awareness and dependence on non-renewable energy sources. They argue that Indonesia must address these challenges to fully realize the benefits of a green economy, ensuring a sustainable and inclusive future.

Azwar (2023) analyze Indonesia's role in advocating for sustainable economic development during its G-20 Presidency, focusing on the balance between economic growth and environmental sustainability. The authors highlight how Indonesia used its position in the G-20 to promote climate change policies and advocate for a green economy at the international level. They emphasize that Indonesia's leadership at the G-20 strengthened its global influence and aligned international economic policies with its national priorities, underscoring the significance of sustainable development as a key component of Indonesia's foreign policy and national interest. The role of community empowerment in Indonesia's development, particularly its impact on local governance, poverty alleviation, and decentralization. The study highlights that empowering local communities can strengthen governance structures and foster resilience, especially in the wake of challenges like the COVID-19 pandemic. The author emphasizes that adapting empowerment strategies to local contexts is crucial for success and sustainability, and stresses the importance of community leadership in overcoming socio-economic obstacles. The findings demonstrate that community empowerment is a fundamental component of Indonesia's development strategy, contributing to both local autonomy and national progress.

Azwar (2023) examines the factors influencing economic empowerment within tourism development in Bukit Lawang, Indonesia. Their study reveals that while tourism has the potential to drive economic growth, its benefits are often concentrated among elites and external operators, leaving local communities with limited gains. The authors identify several barriers to equitable benefit-sharing, including insufficient community involvement, low-skilled job opportunities, and cultural challenges. Additionally, geographical disparities exacerbate the unequal distribution of tourism-related profits, underscoring the need for more inclusive and community-centered tourism strategies that can ensure broader empowerment. Moreover, Kelly-Fair et al. (2022) discuss the growing role of Indonesia's digital economy, particularly in e-commerce, in promoting sustainable economic development. They highlight how the digital economy has contributed significantly to the country's GDP and job creation, with projections indicating continued growth. Despite challenges such as limited infrastructure and international bandwidth, government policies and a young, tech-savvy population are key factors driving this transformation. The study emphasizes the potential of digital platforms to foster economic inclusivity and sustainability, presenting the digital economy as a promising avenue for Indonesia's long-term development goals.

Fitrah & Soemitra (2022) examine the fluctuating growth of small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in Gowa Regency, Indonesia, identifying both successes and challenges. The study reveals that government support and training have fostered periods of growth for SMEs; however, the sector faces significant obstacles, including

poor management, inadequate financial practices, and limited access to capital. The authors highlight the need for improved human resources and reduced operational costs, such as high rental fees, while noting ongoing government efforts to enhance competitiveness and address these issues. Their research underscores the importance of consistent and targeted interventions for sustainable SME development. Irawan et al. (2019) investigates Indonesia's implementation of the Blue Economy concept, focusing on empowering coastal communities in the context of the ASEAN Economic Community. The study emphasizes the role of sustainable marine resource management, eco-friendly technologies, and the promotion of ecotourism in enhancing fisheries productivity. Government policies are shown to play a central role in facilitating community empowerment through training and infrastructure improvements. Despite these efforts, the article underscores the challenges of implementing a successful Blue Economy, particularly the need for further infrastructural development and the integration of environmental sustainability into economic strategies.

Indarti et al. (2019) discusses the challenges and policy strategies for sustaining Indonesia's economic growth, highlighting the country's improved financial stability but acknowledging significant structural obstacles. The study focuses on issues such as the current account deficit and social welfare, pointing out that without structural reforms, inclusive institutions, and efficient resource management, Indonesia risks stagnating or falling into the middle-income trap. Indarti et al. (2019) stresses the need for comprehensive policy strategies that balance economic growth with long-term sustainability, ensuring that growth is both inclusive and resilient to global economic shifts. Latifah (2024) examines the effectiveness of Indonesia's social welfare programs from an Islamic economic perspective. While Indonesia has made efforts to improve social welfare, the study finds that these initiatives have not been equally successful across the nation, nor do they fully adhere to Islamic principles of social insurance. Latifah (2024) calls for a reformulation of the welfare system that aligns with Islamic teachings, emphasizing moral foundations, halal-haram guidelines, and a more inclusive approach to welfare that ensures social justice for all members of society. Apriantoro et al. (2024) explore the shortcomings of Indonesia's economic empowerment strategies in addressing poverty, particularly during the New Order era. They argue that despite economic growth, poverty remained persistent, particularly among vulnerable groups such as women and children, with the 1998 economic crisis exacerbating these issues. The authors suggest that systemic problems such as inequality, education disparities, and bureaucratic inefficiency need to be addressed through equitable economic policies like progressive taxation to ensure sustainable poverty reduction. Their analysis highlights the importance of creating policies that are more inclusive and better targeted to the needs of marginalized populations.

The research highlights the critical need for targeted strategies to promote sustainable economic development in Indonesia, particularly in the face of regional

disparities, poverty, and the transition to a green economy. The studies emphasize the challenges posed by inadequate infrastructure, financial constraints, and systemic inequalities, urging for government intervention and investment to address these gaps. The importance of empowering vulnerable groups through economic initiatives is also stressed, with a focus on overcoming barriers such as limited funding and lack of awareness. Moreover, the role of sustainable innovation in sectors like agriculture, fisheries, and tourism is recognized as a transformative force for fostering inclusive growth. The studies also highlight the potential of digital technologies and improved productivity to enhance economic development, although challenges like regional disparities and governance issues remain significant obstacles.
